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#### **Statement of Board Responsibilities**

Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

Section 51 of that Act requires the ETB to keep in such form and in respect of such accounting periods as may be approved by the Minister for Education and Skills with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform, all proper and usual accounts of the monies received or expended by it.

- (c) disclose and explain any material departures from the standard accounting policies

The Board is responsible for keeping proper books of account which disclose with reasonable accuracy at any time the financial position of the Board and which enable it to ensure that the Financial Statements comply with section 51 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013.

The Board is also responsible for safeguarding its assets and for taking reasonable steps for the prevention and detection of fraud and other irregularities.

#### Statement on Internal Control

#### 2019

Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board (KWETB) was established on 1 July 2013 under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013. On that date, KWETB took over the assets, liabilities and functions of the former County VECs of Kildare and Wicklow.

The Code of Governance for ETBs which relates to 2019 is set out in Circular Letter 0002/2019 which was issued by the Department of Education and Skills to all ETBs on 30<sup>th</sup> January 2019 and this was reviewed by the Board in April 2019. The Finance Committee met four times in 2019. The Finance Committee met on 19<sup>th</sup> March 2020 to review the Financial Statements and recommended their adoption to the Board.

The Audit and Risk Committee met three times in 2019, the committee met a further three times in 2020 to consider the accounts of the reporting period 2019.

# Responsibility for the System of Internal Control

As Chairperson of KWETB, I acknowledge the responsibility of the Board for ensuring that an efficient and effective system of internal control is maintained and operated. The system can only provide reasonable and not absolute assurance that assets are safeguarded, transactions are authorised and properly recorded, and that material errors or irregularities are either prevented or would be detected in a timely period.

A new board was constituted for KWETB on 25th of July 2019 and at its meeting on the 10th September 2019 the board began the appointment of the new Finance and Audit and Risk Committees.

#### **Key Control Procedures**

The Board has taken steps to ensure an appropriate control environment by:

- Ensuring that management and staff responsibilities in relation to internal controls are in place.
- Establishing procedures for evaluating the effectiveness of Internal Controls, reporting control failures and ensuring appropriate action.
- Establishing procedures for identifying and evaluating all risks which could prevent KWETB from achieving its objectives.

The system of internal control operated in KWETB is based on:

- Detailed administrative procedures
- Segregation of duties
- Specific authorisations
- Internal checks
- Monthly reports created outlining the actual and budgeted results of programmes operated by KWETB.

The Board's monitoring and review of the effectiveness of the system of internal control is informed by the:

- Recommendations made by the Office of the Comptroller and Auditor General in management letters or other reports.
- Chief Executive, who has responsibility for the control framework.
- Work of the Audit and Risk Committee, which considers internal audit reports, reports of the C&AG and reports to the Board regarding whether the Chief Executive is, in the Audit and Risk Committee's opinion, operating adequate and appropriate systems of internal control.

#### Internal audit

An Internal Audit function is provided by the Internal Audit Unit - Education and Training Boards."

"The audit findings are based on the IAU-ETBs terms of reference and the internal audit unit provides an overall audit opinion on the area audited"

"The overall opinion is based on the findings identified during the audit and the range of possible opinions are as follows

- o Comprehensive system of internal control is adequate and operates effectively
- o Adequate system of internal control is generally adequate and operates effectively
- Inadequate system of internal control is inadequate and does not operate effectively"
- Information Technology an audit of information technology systems and network management control review was carried out
  in August 2017 and the final report was received by KWETB in January 2019. The IAU-ETB concluded that KWETB had an
  inadequate system of internal control in place in the area audited, specifically with reference to disaster recovery and business
  continuity plans. KWETB are actively developing a BCP and associated controls.

KWETB are committed to implementing the recommendations as outlined by the auditors. A number of measures have already been put in place in response to the findings of the audit

- o Disaster Recovery KWETB are actively engaging with external vendors to formulate a suitable and effective solution
- Recommendations in relation to backups of corporate data have been implemented
- o Internal controls in relation to system and data access have been strengthened and reviewed regularly
- Mobile devices are now encrypted and managed by Mobile Device Management (MDM) software.
- o Procurement for onsite ICT Support and ICT Managed Services has taken place and is at award stage.
- o A number of ICT policies are being reviewed at a national level and will be implemented accordingly

There were 28 recommendations. 22 are implemented, 3 partially implemented and 3 are not yet implemented.

Youthreach - The Youthreach audit was carried out in September 2018 with the final report received in April 2019. The opinion of
the auditor concluded that KWETB has an adequate system of internal control for Youthreach Programmes.

A total of 13 recommendations were made, categorised as the following:

- 4 high recommendations of which 3 are partially implemented
- 6 medium recommendations of which 2 are implemented
- 3 low recommendations of which 2 are implemented
- Audits were also carried out in Procurement and a Review of Previous audits during 2019. The reports for these were received
  in May and June 2020. The IAU-ETB concluded that KWETB had an adequate system of internal control in place in the areas
  audited. The audit reports have been reviewed and implementation of recommendations has commenced.

# Non-compliance with procurement guidelines

KWETB has identified that the total spend where a supplier has been paid in excess of €25k in 2019 with no contract in place amounts to €2,953,732 The non-compliant procurement amount relates to aggregated spend across the organisation across a number of categories of spend including managed print services, bus hire, mock exam papers, furniture and equipment, catering supplies, ICT, school diaries and woodwork materials. KWETB operates a hybrid procurement model with certain areas of construction, ICT, services and supplies being procured centrally where the aggregated value exceeds €25k. There are instances where goods and services have been procured locally in line with the KWETB procurement policy but the aggregated value across all sites exceeds the national tendering threshold of €25k. This is a particularly acute problem as KWETB do not operate a centralised purchasing function and there are multiple schools and centres engaged in daily local procurement exercises. This issue has been further exacerbated by the growth of the organisation in recent years and the limitations of the financial systems we operate. Given the size and nature of the organisation and the extent of expenditure under various categories of goods and services, full compliance will remain a challenge for the organisation.

KWETB have completed a Corporate Procurement Plan and a MAPP (multi-annual procurement plan) which is based on an analysis of the 2019 expenditure and we are taking steps to increase our compliance by targeting areas highlighted by our analysis.

66% of the non-compliant procurement has been regularised since 2019 as new contracts and frameworks have been/ are currently being put in place for the supply of managed print, furniture and equipment, stationery, ICT equipment, onsite technical support, bus hire and waste management. Other key tenders are being planned for 2021.

The response to the internal Procurement Compliance Audit above, outlines the steps KWETB has and will take to reduce the level of non-compliant procurement expenditure in 2020.

# Department of Social Welfare Services Review

Kildare and Wicklow ETB were found to be partially compliant, in relation to daily records of children availing of the school meals service, in one school following an inspection on 2016/2017 academic year. The finding was issued to KWETB in 2019 and the recommendation subsequently implemented.

#### 2018 Contractual Claim

A sum of €10.7m is the anticipated total cost paid in respect of the final account submitted on a contract awarded in 2015 for a major school building works project, part of which (€3,161,718) related to a settlement of the final account claims submitted in relation to those works.

#### Risk management

Following the implementation of the new Code of Practice for the Governance of Education and Training Boards 30th Jan 2019, KWETB, in conjunction with IPB (Irish Public Bodies), carried out a comprehensive review of risk management in KWETB. Enhancements to KWETB's approach to risk management were made to ensure greater alignment with the new Code. As a result, a robust system of risk management is being implemented in KWETB underpinned by a Risk Management Strategy, Risk Management Policy and Risk Management Framework all signed off by the Board. Individual Risk Registers have been developed and are actively managed for the Corporation, Schools, FET and OSD. The Audit and Risk Committee review the registers at every meeting of the committee and the Director of OSD management at each Board meeting. Although risk is actively managed on a daily basis the Senior Management Team review the corporate risks formally on a monthly basis. FET, Schools and OSD also have their own schedule for reviewing risks in their areas on a regular basis with significant risks being elevated to the Corporate Risk Register for review by the Senior Management Team.

# **Corporate Governance Programme**

KWETB is committed to the implementation of best practice corporate governance and developed the KWETB Corporate Governance Programme to enhance the same. This programme was initiated in December 2018 and was informed by The Code of Practice for ETB's 2019, recommendations of the Thorn Report (2018), C&AG reports and other relevant statutory instruments and circulars. The programme identified 7 key themes, Policies and procedures, statutory reporting, governance, procurement, internal control and risk management, organisation restructuring and Ethics in Public Office. The Corporate Governance programme was completed in May 2020 and the steering group signed off with a final report brought to the Board. KWETB is committed to continuing to enhance corporate governance in KWETB implementing best practices and standards.

### Leasing arrangements

An audit of KWETB leasing arrangements commenced in February 2020. Kildare and Wicklow ETB have reviewed and revised its procedures around leasing arrangements and will further review the procedures in the context of any audit findings.

# **Accounting records**

The system for recording financial transactions used by the majority of the former VECs is an out-dated single-entry system that is not fit for purpose. The IT system used for paying trainees (TAPS) is a legacy system written in old computer language which is no longer supported. It has experienced a number of technical difficulties in recent times. KWETB requires a new fit for purpose integrated IT system. This has been requested numerous times and raised in national fora. This is a matter of concern for both the Executive and Audit and Risk committee of KWETB. Pending approval for a new system, KWETB will continue to work with the Department of Education and Skills and the Project Management Office regarding Finance Shared Services.

#### Single Public Service Pension Scheme

Circular Letter 11/2014 obliges ETBs to provide benefits statements and calculations to members of the Single Public Service Pension Scheme by the end of June 2014. Progress has been made by KWETB to meet this statutory obligation and pension statements have been issued to approximately 5% of staff. Work continues to ensure full compliance with the circular is achieved.

### **Payroll Shared Service**

The Education Shared Business Service (ESBS) has been established to deliver shared services in the Education sector. The migration of KWETB payroll for all staff will take place in November 2021.

#### **Annual Review of Controls**

Kildare and Wicklow ETB is committed to operating an efficient, effective and economic internal control system. I confirm that the Audit and Risk Committee at its meetings held in January and March 2020, conducted a review of the effectiveness of the system of internal financial control for year ended 31 December 2019 in the manner prescribed by the Code of Practice for the Governance of Education & Training Boards.

#### This included

- A review of internal and external audit reports issued in 2019 and to date in 2020 along with an examination of minutes of meetings of the Board, Audit and Risk Committee and Finance Committee.
- o The Audit and Risk Committee also got confirmation from the Chief Executive that on balance the system of internal control is adequate and appropriate. The Chief Executive based this statement on information gathered from senior managers across the organisation.
- The Audit and Risk Committee presented a report on the review of controls to the Board on 24 March 2020.
- A Risk Register is kept up-to-date and presented to the Audit and Risk Committee on a regular basis.

The Board reviewed and approved this statement at its meeting held on 24 March 2020.

The Board remains cognisant of the prior recommendations of the C&AG outlined in the 'Supplementary report - Lapses in controls over procurement of capital projects and certain other expenses.' Which was published in 2019 and in the Thorn Report (2018) on the Investigation into certain matters in Kildare and Wicklow ETB published in 2018.

# Opinion on the financial statements

I have audited the financial statements of Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board for the year ended 31 December 2019 as required under the provisions of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013. The financial statements comprise

- the statement of accounting policies
- · the operating statement
- · the statement of current assets and current liabilities, and
- the related notes.

# In my opinion,

- the financial statements properly present the income and expenditure of the Board for 2019 and the state of affairs of the Board at 31 December 2019, and
- the financial statements are in accordance with the accounting policies laid down by the Minister for Education.

#### Basis of opinion

I conducted my audit of the financial statements in accordance with the International Standards on Auditing (ISAs) as promulgated by the International Organisation of Supreme Audit Institutions. My responsibilities under those standards are described in the appendix to this report. I am independent of Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board and have fulfilled my other ethical responsibilities in accordance with the standards.

I believe that the audit evidence I have obtained is sufficient and appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion.

# Report on information other than the financial statements, and on other matters

The Board has presented certain other information together with the financial statements. This comprises the statement of Board responsibilities, the statement on the system of internal control and a schedule of activities and pay costs. My responsibilities to report in relation to such information, and on certain other matters upon which I report by exception, are described in the appendix to this report.

# Appendix to the report

# Non-compliance with procurement rules

The statement on internal control discloses that in 2019 the Board incurred significant expenditure where the procedures followed did not comply with public procurement guidelines. The statement also sets out the steps taken or planned by the Board to address this matter.

# Settlement of building works claims

Note 25 to the financial statements and the statement on internal control disclose that the Board incurred costs totaling €10.7 million in respect of a contract awarded in 2015 for a major school building works project. Part of the costs incurred by the Board (€3.16 million or just under 30% of the total) related to the settlement in 2019 of final account claims under the contract.

# **Responsibilities of Board Members**

# Responsibilities of the Comptroller and Auditor General

I am required under the Education and Training Boards Act 2013 to audit the financial statements of Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board and to report thereon to the Houses of the Oireachtas.

My objective in carrying out the audit is to obtain reasonable assurance about whether the financial statements as a whole are free from material misstatement due to fraud or error. Reasonable assurance is a high level of assurance, but is not a guarantee that an audit conducted in accordance with the ISAs will always detect a material misstatement when it exists. Misstatements can arise from fraud or error and are considered material if, individually or in the aggregate, they could reasonably be expected to influence the economic decisions of users taken on the basis of these financial statements.

As part of an audit in accordance with the ISAs, I exercise professional judgment and maintain professional scepticism throughout the audit. In doing so,

- I identify and assess the risks of material misstatement of
  the financial statements whether due to fraud or error;
  design and perform audit procedures responsive to those
  risks; and obtain audit evidence that is sufficient and
  appropriate to provide a basis for my opinion. The risk of
  not detecting a material misstatement resulting from fraud
  is higher than for one resulting from error, as fraud may
  involve collusion, forgery, intentional omissions,
  misrepresentations, or the override of internal control.
- I obtain an understanding of Internal control relevant to the audit in order to design audit procedures that are appropriate in the circumstances, but not for the purpose of expressing an opinion on the effectiveness of the internal controls.

My opinion on the financial statements does not cover the other information presented with those statements, and I do not express any form of assurance conclusion thereon.

In connection with my audit of the financial statements, I am required under the ISAs to read the other information presented and, in doing so, consider whether the other information is materially inconsistent with the financial statements or with knowledge obtained during the audit, or if it otherwise appears to be materially misstated. If, based on the work I have performed, I conclude that there is a material misstatement of this other information, I am required to report that fact.

#### Reporting on other matters

My audit is conducted by reference to the special considerations which attach to State bodies in relation to their management and operation. I report if I identify material matters relating to the manner in which public business has been conducted.

I seek to obtain evidence about the regularity of financial transactions in the course of audit. I report if I identify any material instance where public money has not been applied for the purposes intended or where transactions did not conform to the authorities governing them.

I also report by exception if, in my opinion,

- I have not received all the information and explanations I required for my audit, or
- the accounting records were not sufficient to permit the financial statements to be readily and properly audited, or
- the financial statements are not in agreement with the accounting records.

The ETB does not make pension contributions in respect of employees. Since 2013 all new entrants are obliged to join the Single Public Pension Scheme.

From 1 January 2019 onwards, members of public service defined pension scheme pay an additional superannuation contribution (ASC) arising from the public service stability agreement (2018-2020) and the Public Service Pay and Pensions Act 2017. ASC replaced the pension related related deduction (PRD) which ceased at the end of 2018. While PRD was a temporary emergency measure, ASC is a permanent contribution in respect of pensionable remuneration. The amount collected in 2019 was €2,736,680 which was remitted to the Department of Education and Skills.

# Establishment of the Education and Training Board and the Accounting Policies of the Financial Statements for the Year Ended 31st December 2019

# 1. Establishment of the Education and Training Board

Kildare and Wicklow Education and Training Board was established on 1 July 2013 and its functions are set out in section 10 of the Education and Training Boards Act 2013. Community National Schools came under the Patronage of the ETB on January 1st 2017.

#### 2. Significant Accounting Policies

# (a) Basis of Presentation

The financial statements are presented in the form approved by the Minister for Education and Skills with the consent of the Minister for Finance and the Minister for Public Expenditure and Reform. They consist of a Statement of Accounting Policies, an Operating Statement, a Statement of Current Assets and Current liabilities and notes to the financial statements.

Where necessary, the comparative figures for the previous year have been reclassified on the same basis as those for the current year.

#### (b) Basis of Preparation

The Operating Statement presents Receipts and Payments by Programme Grouping and the resultant Cash Surplus/(Deficit) is adjusted for other debtor and creditor movements to determine the overall result for the period on an accrual basis.

The Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities is prepared on the accruals basis by determining state grant and other funder balances at amounts that reflect the related expenditure incurred and in accordance with the funding rules.

Third Party Debtors are included in Current Assets. Pay and Expense Liabilities are included in Current Liabilities.

# (c) Tangible fixed assets

All assets purchased including land and buildings, fixtures and fittings and training equipment are expensed in the year of purchase. State grants to fund the purchase of tangible fixed assets are recognised in the same year.

#### (d) Stocks

All consumable stocks are expensed as purchased.

#### (e) Superannuation

The pension entitlements of ETB staff, including those who transferred from SOLAS, are conferred under defined benefits schemes. Staff employed since 2013 are included in the Single Public Service Pension Scheme and monthly payments are made to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

Superannuation deductions made from employees pay in respect of the schemes are retained by the ETB as part of agreed Exchequer funding, or paid over to the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform.

The ETB does not make any contributions towards the schemes.

These unfunded schemes are operated on a pay as you go basis with the annual pension entitlements being paid by the National Shared Services Office on behalf of the ETB. ETB's are responsible for the administration of their pensions. Pension funds are provided by the Department of Education and Skills.

Provision has not been made in the financial statements for the present cost of the future benefits that have accrued to staff members and existing pensioners under these schemes.

# (f) Lease Rentals

All lease rentals are expensed as incurred.

Actual receipts of Retained Superannuation Contributions were €2,873,457, which is €8,303 less than anticipated.

c Non Pay

Department of Education and Skills: Post-Primary Schools and Head Office Non Pay Grant was expected to be funded by direct receipts from grantor of €5,511,901 and forecasted locally raised receipts of €243,050. In 2019 actual locally raised receipts were €381,244 resulting in a surplus of receipts of £138,194 over the amount forecasted. Surplus receipts are due to the Department of Education and Skills and are not considered part of the current year funding.

d Surplus/(Deficit) for 2019

Total grants are set by reference to anticipated expenditure. In the case of Post-Primary Schools and Head Office Non-Pay programmes expenditure limits are set. Expenditure incurred in excess of this limit gives rise to a deficit, whereas savings can be retained and used to fund future deficits. KWETB had a Revenue Surplus of €1,022,065 for the year ended 31/12/2019 [Per Operating Statement page 8] and an Accumulated Revenue Deficit as at 31/12/2019 of €65,977 (Per Operating Statement page 8 and Statement of Current Assets and Current Liabilities page 9]. The deficit on agency and self financing is mainly made up of a deficit on self financing rent of school facilities.

e Total State funding

The difference between the total amount received from grantors of €129,707,695 above and the total in Note 13 - Funding of €132,611,501 is represented by Retained Superannuation Contributions of €2,873,457, state funding received from other Depts other than DES of €30,348.

#### **35 Connected Persons**

KWETB adopts procedures in accordance with the guidelines issued by the Department of Public Expenditure and Reform covering the personal interests of Board members. In the normal course of business, KWETB may approve grants or enter into other contractual arrangements with entities in which KWETB Board members are employed or are otherwise interested.

In cases of potential conflict of interest, Board members do not receive Board documentation or otherwise participate in or attend discussions regarding these transactions. A register is maintained and available on request of all such instances.

KWETB had related party transactions with one company connected to a Board member. Total Value of payments to this company in 2019 was €47.645.

### 36 Events after the year end

Since the end of the reporting period, the economy and the ETB sector have been significantly affected by the Covid-19 pandemic. However, KWETB continues to carry out it's vital role in education and training while being focused on ensuring continuity of education for learners, including a particular focus on more vulnerable students.

The effects of the pandemic will have financial implications for KWETB in 2020 and beyond. The financial impacts of Covid 19 commenced in March 2020 and given the unprecedented uncertainty of the situation that KWETB finds itself in, a reliable estimate of the costs and savings arising from COVID 19 cannot not be made at this time. However, the main factors giving rise to additional costs and reduction in income are as follows:

- Additional unplanned expenditure on ICT equipment and software support to enable the continuation of learning for students and the safety of its employees by remote working.
- Additional costs to deliver training as it is expected that extra training allowances to participants in further education
  and training programmes will continue until courses are completed which may lead to some additional costs over the summer
  months.
- Anticipated reductions in income. KWETB anticipates a reduction in self-generated Income as some programmes are
  on hold and the Outdoor Education Centres have temporarily closed. PLC fee income is also likely to be reduced as more
  participants become eligible for free fees.

It is anticipated that the additional costs will be partially offset by savings in the areas of

- substitution costs.
- · consumables and costs incurred for contract management services and
- savings associated with the delivery of apprenticeships as most apprentices are released to their employers and there are
  no further intakes currently (it should be noted that this delay is likely however to lead to greater costs from 2021).

KWETB has taken the following steps to manage the effects of the pandemic

- From the commencement this crisis KWETB engaged its business continuity plan to ensure that its operations continued as normal in line with it regulatory requirements.
- The Audit and Risk Committee has updated KWETB's risk register to take account of the specific risks arising and will develop and ensure implementation of additional control measures as required.
- The Department of Education and Skills has put in place a range of steering and engagement structures to support the
  education and training system in navigating the challenges of Covid 19. KWETB is participating in these structures to ensure a
  joined-up approach across the education sector.

In the medium to long term, the ETB sector will have a significant role to play in the overall tertiary system response needed for labour market activation which will form part of a broader cross government and cross agency response. As a result, there will be a particular focus on effective management of resources and capacity.
